

Robert E. Lee, Town Manager's Report to Town Council

Town Council Meeting: November 16, 2015

Paderewski Pond – Public Forum 11/19/15

- The Paderewski Pond Forum will be held this Thursday, November 19th beginning at 6:30 pm in the Town Council Chambers. The purpose of the Forum is to begin a dialogue regarding the maintenance of the area and to give people the opportunity to give town staff feedback on issues that they feel need to be addressed. Town staff will give a brief presentation regarding the history and geography of the pond before opening up for questions and comments. Don Mysling from the Department of Energy & Environmental Protection will be in attendance as well.
- Residents are encouraged to attend the Forum and to participate in the discussion.

Turf Field Update

- The turf field installation continues and is expected to be ready for the Thanksgiving Day game against Farmington. The Turf Field Committee took action at their last meeting to discuss and plan for the eventual cost of replacing the field when its useful life has been reached. Generally this would occur 10-12 years after installation and use.
- The Board of Education has already committed to reprogramming funds that were previously used to pay for the irrigation of the existing grass field. This has been costing the Board approximately \$10,000 per year.
- The Turf Committee is recommending that the youth organizations include a "annual participant fee" for every child that will be using the turf field. These monies, along with the BOE annual contribution, would be put into a separate fund managed by the Finance Director within the Capital Improvement Fund.
- Finally, the Turf Committee is suggesting that a Committee be formed to recommend an appropriate way to honor the Tinty Foundation for their generous gift of \$1M. The Town Council is responsible for the naming of town owned facilities.

LED Streetlight Project Update

- The LED streetlight conversion is in full swing. The project started in the northwest section of town and the contractor is installing approximately 60 LED lights a day. The project is expected to be completed by the first week in December.
- ESCO has recently met with Town IT staff to discuss the WIFI component in the downtown business area. It is anticipated that the free WIFI will allow for users to perform normal download and upload functions. The system will not allow for "live streaming". Town IT staff is working with ESCO to negotiate the cost of operating the WIFI component with some of the costs being potentially offset by advertising revenue from the network.

has determined that the proposed trail does not impact the wetlands and the Planning & Zoning Commission has determined that the proposed trail and pavilion is in conformance with Plainville's Comprehensive Plan of Development.

- A Memorandum of Understanding regarding the new pavilion to be constructed by the Town of Farmington on Northwest Drive in Plainville for the Farmington Canal Heritage Trail has been included in your package for tonight's meeting. The MOU calls for Farmington to design, bid and construct the pavilion using state grant monies on Plainville and State owned properties. Farmington will also provide construction administration and inspection services for the project.
- The Town of Farmington will also provide maintenance of the trail, including sweeping and line markings from Northwest Drive to the Plainville-Farmington border.
- After completion, Plainville will be responsible for the ownership and maintenance responsibilities for the improvements located in our town. The Town will also indemnify the State with regards to any claims of bodily or person injury and death and property damaged occasioned by accident or other event occurring upon, or resulting from a condition arising from the improvements within Plainville. This is standard insurance language required on all trail properties not owned by the State.
- It is anticipated that the project will be completed next summer. There is an item under New Business regarding the Memorandum of Understanding with the Town of Farmington.

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Criminals Target Packages for Theft from Your Doorstep - And Use Fake Email Notices

It is not unusual to receive a package at this time of year, and Connecticut Better Business Bureau is warning consumers about two of the most prevalent criminal schemes involving package deliveries.

According to law enforcement and the United States Postal Inspection Service, one tactic involves thieves following a parcel delivery truck along its route. Once the package is delivered and the coast is clear, they steal it to look for electronics and other valuables. Sometimes criminals will walk around a neighborhood looking for packages left on people's property.

Legitimate delivery companies will leave a tag on your door if nobody was home to accept a parcel. They will not send you an email.

Connecticut Better Business Bureau offers tips to avoid falling victim to package delivery fraud:

Ignore email notices about missed deliveries -Now that you know about the fake "missed delivery" emails, be wary of them regardless of where they appear to come from.

Arrange for pickup - If you are expecting a delivery and not able to wait for it, let the driver know you will pick up the parcel yourself by making that selection on the delivery tag.

Ask for delivery at specific time - You also can select an option for the

parcel to be delivered at a given date and time when you know you will be home. You also can track a package, and if it doesn't show up, call to see if it was delivered.

When you order merchandise for delivery, you can also specify that it be shipped to your workplace or a neighbor to prevent its theft.

We believe in the American Dream.

We support our nation's long tradition of humanitarian aid and welcoming refugees from around the world in search of a better life in the United States.

But we want the taxpayers we represent to know the following:

We feel that the recent decision by Gov. Dannel P. Malloy to allow refugees from Syria into Connecticut, while well intentioned, could potentially threaten the security of our residents.

Ensuring the safety of our citizens is a fundamental responsibility of our state and federal government.

Given the recent terrorist attacks in Paris, we must be on heightened alert and give extra scrutiny to refugees coming into the United States.

Until we have more answers, we must proceed with extreme caution.

Republican legislative leaders have written to our Connecticut Congressional Delegation and to Gov. Malloy, asking the following questions:

Do we have assurances that extensive background checks will be conducted? Who will be responsible for paying for the related costs? If the state is responsible, how will the state pay for the refugees to live here given our budget deficits? Will this be a permanent cost to the state? Where will they live?

Until we can confirm the security and vetting process for refugees and guarantee that the people coming to Connecticut are not a threat to the safety of our residents, we believe we should not grant entry.

We urge residents to continue contacting the governor with their concerns during business hours at 860-566-4840.



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



Now everyone has to go online to get this estimate and only some of the information provided in the statements is available online.

So, when you make the decision to file for social security benefits be sure to do it right the first time by knowing what you are getting and what you are forfeiting.

- 3. This product will help safeguard property by deterring theft through awareness that we have such technology available to our citizens and by providing a way to identify stolen property thereby facilitating the arrest of the perpetrator and return of stolen property to the owner.
- 4. Your property protection is "Traceable by law enforcement across the USA."
- 5. Pet Emergency/ Warning Stickers to display "In case of Emergency!"
- 6. that pets are inside your home.
- 7. House Warning Stickers that "All items in this home are marked with . . . ANTI THEFT DOTS.



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




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From My Balcony By Jeannette Hinkson

vilified and almost tarred and feathered by Democrats when she voiced her concern about Muslims taking over our government.



Chestnuts roasting on an open fire...

While you may not celebrate Christmas, perhaps "The Christmas Song", stirs up childhood memories of past holidays or other winter celebrations with family and friends.

For me, it creates, perhaps, an unrealistic image of a magical time of the year when everything seems perfect. Presents under the tree, the house beautifully decorated; family parties that were fun, and full of laughter and song. Everyone looked glamorous and beautiful. The food was plentiful and delicious. Snow meant a day off from school.

It also makes me think of chestnuts. These wonderfully delicious warm treats were part of our holidays. As I think back to meals at our Grandparents house, they always came out after dinner along with fresh fruit and pies and cakes. There were my brother's favorite and we sometimes looked like we were juggling as we tossed them in the air to keep these hot brown nuggets fresh from the oven from burning our hands.

I never thought about where they actually come from, until recently, when I was at the Amherst Farmer's Market and saw how they grow on the mighty Chestnut tree, cradled in a velvet lined pocket inside a large spiny sharp burr.

The Mighty Chestnut Tree, which once ruled the forest in North America, provided this delicious nutty fruit that supported the wild life and returned important nutrients to the soil. It was a common building material. A fungus largely took out the Chestnut tree in the early 1900's. Thankfully, due to the hard work of scientist and growers, this species is coming back. The goal of the American Chestnut Foundation is to restore the American chestnut tree to the eastern woodlands to benefit our environment, wildlife, and society. Over 6,000 members & volunteers support this effort. In their own way, they are creating miracles and memories for future generations.

Chestnuts are flavorful gluten-free food. They contain proteins and have the lowest fat content of any edible nut. Chestnuts are full of vitamins, B-complexes and many minerals. They are a good source of fiber. Chestnuts are relatively low in calories when compared to other natural seeds and nuts.

Chestnuts are often used in stuffing and roasted as a stand-alone treat. Chestnuts can also be dried and milled into flour, which can then be used to prepare breads, cakes, or pancakes or used as a thickener for stews soups and sauces.

Roasting Chestnuts is easy. Preheat over to 375°F. Wipe the chestnuts off with a damp cloth and set them flat side down on a cutting board. With a sharp knife, cut a small slit on the top of each chestnut. Always slit the shell to allow the steam to escape. Failing to do this could result in a small explosion in your oven. Not the type of excitement you are looking for during your holiday dinner party and, let's face it, you already have enough cleaning up to do. Place in a roasting pan and cook for about 30 minutes. Check one after 20 minutes. The nut inside should be soft and chewy and it's a fine line between just right and too dry. Carefully remove from pan and peel when still hot. You might want to put a towel over them and crush to make this easier to peel and to avoid burning your fingers. They are harder to peel when cold, so you won't want to make them too far in advance of when you plan to eat them. If they do cool, you can put them in oven to re-heat.

You can store fresh unpeeled chestnuts at room temperature about a week and in a plastic bag with holes for airflow in your refrigerator for about 2-3 weeks. Once cooked and unpeeled, you might as well just eat them because they don't last more than a few days in your refrigerator.

Turn up the volume on "The Christmas Song" and Enjoy! Merry Christmas and a Very Happy 2016!

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.

8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital.

Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!

A challenge to the internet age: half of consumers in the Northeast prefer info over the phone

Despite the impact of the digital revolution, half of consumers in America's Northeast prefer to receive information over the phone rather than going online, research has revealed.

The study of 2,234 US respondents, conducted by audio branding specialist PH Media Group, found 50 per cent of people in the region favour the phone when searching for basic information on a company, such as opening hours or details of products and services.

This result might come as a surprise, given Americans spend an average of 11 hours each day using electronic media but older generations are particularly fond of the phone.

Across the US, fifty-seven per cent of 55 to 64-year-olds and 53 per cent of 45 to 54-year-olds prefer calling over using the internet, compared to less than half of 35 to 44-year-olds (49 per cent), 25 to 35-year-olds (45 per cent) and 18 to 24-year-olds (42 per cent).

"Although we have entered a digital age, the results of this study suggest people still prefer the reassurance of being able to pick up the phone to receive a direct answer to queries they have about a particular business," said Mark Williamson, Sales and Marketing Director, PH Media Group.

"As such, it provides a clear message to businesses in the Northeast that they should not neglect traditional methods of communication. Large amounts of budget are devoted to ensuring websites are eye-catching, responsive and provide a positive user experience but call handling practice must also meet the same standards.

"At a basic level this means ensuring staff are properly trained on how to answer calls but it also means carefully controlling all voice and music customers hear while on the phone. It is important to ensure all audio is brand congruent, reinforcing desired company values."

Further results revealed 37 per cent of Northeastern consumers actually prefer to receive information quickly via an on-hold message rather than speaking to a customer service advisor.

This trend is particularly strong among younger generations. Almost half of 18 to 34-year-olds (49 per cent) in America prefer to receive information via an on-hold message, compared to 32 per cent of people aged over 35.

Mark added: "Traditionally, being left on hold is perceived as an irritation for consumers but these results suggest it can actually become a positive if managed correctly.

"By implementing solutions such as on-hold marketing, companies can turn previously 'dead air' into a valuable opportunity for communicating key information to customers while they wait on the line."

Refugees and Jihad: A Brief Study in Math By Francis Rexford Cooley

The coordinated attacks on Paris, France by ISIS is a sobering reminder to the Western World the conflict it is engaged in with Islamic Jihadists bent on imposing a caliphate upon much of Europe, Africa, and Asia. Both Al-Qaeda and the Taliban promote a similar form of Jihadism as ISIS and Boko Haram do. For much of near fifteen years since 9/11 many Western leaders and opinion makers have viewed the various Jihadist groups waging war in the Middle East, Africa, and Asia and terrorist attacks in North America and Australia as being conducted by groups or "lone wolf" individuals distinguished by their differences rather than shared ideology. With the massive movement of Moslem populations into the West a brief examination of the shared Jihadist views of Moslem populations may be prudent for policymakers especially regarding immigration.

In 2013 the Pew Research Group conducted a public opinion poll regarding favorability and un-favorability ratings of Hezbollah, Hamas, Al-Qaeda, and the Taliban among the populations of eleven Muslim majority countries among other issues. Both Al-Qaeda and the Taliban received favorability ratings of 13%. Hezbollah and Hamas both received higher favorability ratings (26% and 32% respectively). Both Hezbollah and Hamas can be considered as Arab-nationalist groups and are defined by many including themselves for their war against Israel. Al-Qaeda and the Taliban represent both Jihad against all "infidels" and the incarnation of what a "pure" Islamic state would be. As such their favorability ratings can be seen as a proxy for Jihadist sentiment. Taking the 13% favorability rating being near equal to overall Jihadist sentiment and reducing that percentage to 10% to provide a more conservative analysis one can examine the potential impact of unfettered emigration from the Islamic World to the West.

According to Reuters some 500,000 Moslem refugees have recently made their way to Europe. If one assumes 10% have Jihadist sentiment then 50,000 of the recent arrivals are supportive of Jihad. If a mere 1% of those refugees with Jihadist sentiment are willing to act on that sentiment then Europe has let 500 potential terrorists in. If 10% of those with Jihadist sentiment are willing to act on that sentiment the number becomes 5,000 or to a size larger than an Army brigade from that of a battalion. For the United States it has been advocated by some in the Obama Administration to bring in 100,000 Muslim refugees into the country by 2017, that would mean some 10,000 with Jihadist sentiment and if only 1% were willing to act 100 potential terrorists (a small Army Company) and 1,000 potential terrorists if 10% of those with Jihadist sentiment are willing to act (a large Army battalion or small Army regiment) will be brought into the United States.

It is incumbent upon U.S. policymakers to keep American interests at the forefront of any policy decision. It only took nineteen terrorists to create the havoc of 9/11, only two for the Boston Marathon Bombing, and eight for the savage multiprong attack on Paris. What could, and will, 100 to 1,000 do to America as they arrive with the "Syrian" refugees as this simple mathematical analysis suggests they will. It is a question Europe is already grappling with after the fact.

From the Desk Of..... Thomas A. Wurz, Esquire CRIMINAL CHARGES FOR THE GRINCH

The holiday season is upon us again and for some the ongoing saga of keeping up with the Jones pushes them break the law in an attempt to get what they want. Hopefully, this is not your reality come this time of year. Let's just use it as an opportunity to review larceny in the state of Connecticut.

There are six degrees of larceny in Connecticut. Three are misdemeanors and three are felonies. Larceny is when a person wrongfully takes, obtains, or withholds someone else's property with the intent to permanently deprive the owner of the property, or to appropriate it to a third person. Misdemeanors are crimes punishable by up to one year in jail along with other conditions. Felonies are crimes with punishment that exceed one year in jail and other conditions.

Misdemeanor larcenies in Connecticut are larceny in the sixth degree, fifth degree and fourth degree. These charges cover up to \$2000 worth of property or services claimed to be wrongfully taken, obtained or withheld. These misdemeanors usually result from the types of shoplifting that might occur around holiday shopping.

Felony larcenies in Connecticut are larceny in the third degree, second degree and first degree. These charges cover anything over \$2000 worth of property or services claimed to be wrongfully taken, obtained or withheld. These felonies usually result from more complicated schemes. Typically they involve embezzlement or wire fraud where it is not merely a one-time transaction, but a series of transactions over a period of time.

I hope this doesn't dampen your holiday spirit, but reinforces what should truly be what is important during this season of togetherness. Thank you for another year of support and I look forward to continuing to bring you informative and interesting articles in the year 2016!

This memory takes me back to a place and time when things were simpler.





- 2 -1/2 pounds of sausage meat, lightly sauteed
- Goose liver finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon ground sage
- 1 cup applesauce

Approximately 100 residents and veterans attended the ceremony at 11 am on Veterans Day.



Fast-paced Lifestyle Eroding Teens' Teeth



Premature loss of tooth enamel and weakening of overall tooth structure are two devastating oral effects of teens' poor diet that cannot be reversed later in life according to a study that appeared in General Dentistry, the clinical, peerreviewed journal of the Academy of General Dentistry (AGD).

Adolescence is the time of peak bone growth, a time when more nutrientpacked calories are essential to fuel growing bodies and strengthen teeth and bones, however adolescence is the same time when soda and sugary, highcarbohydrate foods are rapidly displacing healthy foods such as milk, fruits and vegetables.

The easy access of sugary beverages and foods from home to school and everywhere in between has compromised the health of teens' teeth and helped fuel the national obesity epidemic.

The report shows drinking carbonated beverages seems to be one of the most significant causes of increased cavities and obesity for today's teens. Fifteen percent of American adolescents ages 6 to 19 are overweight. This number is expected to increase. Why? Ten percent of overweight preschool-age children ages 2 to 5 are becoming addicted to caffeine and sugar, which makes it harder for them to stop unhealthy habits such as drinking soda throughout the day.

The phosphoric, citric, tartaric and carbonic acids in soda are linked to the breakdown of tooth enamel around dental sealants and restorations, further compromising teens' teeth and leading to more extensive dental treatment to prevent total tooth loss.

Soft drinks and bone density

The phosphoric acid in most regular and diet cola drinks tends to limit calcium absorption and has a direct influence on bone density. By age 16, girls have accumulated 90 to 97 percent of their bone mass, making adequate calcium intake vital. However, national statistics show only 19 percent of girls ages 9 to 19 are getting the recommended 1,300 milligrams of calcium a day.

Research also confirms a direct link between soft drink consumption and bone fractures in teenage girls.

Girls are at an extreme risk for developing osteoporosis, already exhibiting symptoms of this disease in their teen years. Early education on the importance of calcium consumption is essential to reversing this trend.






Church in Plainville for a Carol Sing. This is a glorious time to "fill the air with music," the beautiful music of Christmas.
