## Robert E. Lee, Town Manager's Report to Town Council MAY 20th Town Council Meetings

#### FY2020 Budget Update

- Last Tuesday the second All-Day vote was held to consider the Education budget. There were 1,235 persons who voted. (10.67%).The budget was passed overwhelmingly with 863 voting "yes" (70%) and those voting "no" totaling 369 (30%). Although the budget passed and the advisory question is not a factor, it is interesting to note that the majority felt that the budget was "too low" with a vote of 286 versus 260 who felt it was "too high".
- The second budget vote had 60% more participation than the first vote (+467 1,325 v. 768). Almost the same amount of participants voted "no" on the Education budgets (384 v. 369) and the "yes" votes on the Education budget increased by 491 (372 v. 863).
- Based on last week's vote, the total budget stands at \$61,780,822. This is a 2.9% increase over the current year's budget.
- According to the Town Charter, the next step in the process is for

- the Town Council to set the mill rate. (within 30 days of budget vote). Town staff is recommending a mill rate of 34.62 which is 0.78 mills higher than the current rate. It would increase taxes by 2.3%. This recommendation includes the \$100,000 reduction to the Education budget and a \$40K increase in "investment income" based upon the Town's latest estimates.
- The budget still includes a payment for the teacher's pension as recommended in the Governor's proposed budget (\$107,640) and does not include the increase in ECS to Plainville as proposed in the Appropriations Committee recommendation. (\$15,706). There are significant doubts that the State Budget will not be adopted by the end of the Legislative Session on June 5th.
- There is an item under New Business regarding the setting of the mill rate for FY20.

#### **Water Forum Discussion**

 Last Tuesday evening a Public Information Forum was held at the Middle School to hear a presentation of the "Valley Water Hardness Removal Evaluation" that was done by Tighe & Bond. Representatives from the State Department of Health, the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority (PURA) and the Plainville Southington Health District were in attendance. In addition, approximately 35 residents attended the forum.

- The study concluded that the most cost effective way to lower the hardness of the water was to put an ion exchange treatment system at both well locations. According to the study, this would lower the hardness from the "very hard" category (> 180 ppm) to the midrange of the "hard" category (120-180 ppm).
- The estimated cost of the treatment system is 3.66M and would increase operating costs by \$99K per year. According to Valley Water, rates would increase by 18% for the users. Residents that currently pay \$30 a month, would see their water bill increase by \$5.40. The increase would be higher for those whose monthly water bills are in excess of \$30 per month.
- Valley Water is hesitant about installing this "Ion Exchange System" because they do not believe that the majority of their customers want to pay more for these improvements. Some residents attending the forum disputed the methodology used by Valley Water to survey their customers regarding the willingness to pay for the hardness removal equipment.
- Town staff plans to meet with State officials and Valley Water representatives in the near future to discuss the public comments from the Forum and to determine what next steps, if any, would be appropriate.

#### **Road Bond Program Update**

- The last paving season for the 5-Year Road Bond is expected to be completed by July 1st. This project covered roads that were last repayed in the 1980's.
- Town staff is preparing a recommendation to propose a second 5-Year Road Bond Program. Further details regarding Phase 2 will be presented in June.

#### **STEVEN LEPAGE NAMED SUPERINTENDENT FOR PLAINVILLE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS**

Steven LePage, currently assistant superintendent of Plainville Community Schools, has been named superintendent, effective July 1st. LePage will replace Dr. Maureen Brummett, who was recently named superintendent of the Newington, Connecticut school system, where she will begin on July 1st.

LePage, who has been an educator for more than 20 years, began his career as a special education teacher the Connecticut Children's Medical Center School in Newington, Connecticut, and then for East Hartford Schools. He then held several positions in the Wolcott school system, where he served as a special education teacher, as well as the director of adult education, special education department head, and assistant principal of Wolcott High School. LePage began as principal of Plainville High School in July 2010, and was named assistant superintendent in Plainville in July,

During his tenure at Plainville High School, LePage served on a number of committees including the Technology Implementation Committee, Twenty-First Century Skills Committee, the district's Professional Development Committee, and more. Among his achievements while serving Plainville High School's principal, LePage designed and implemented the high school's Curriculum & Activities Showcase, increased college credit earning opportunities with UConn and College Board, spearheaded development of the FIRST Robotics Team, and instituted a Professional Learning Community model to improve student outcomes. He was also responsible for developing the Super Senior Award Program that honors graduating seniors with no disciplinary referrals throughout high school years. These seniors are guests with their families at a formal ceremony in celebration of positive character.

superintendent, assistant As LePage co-facilitated the District Strategic Planning Committee, orchestrated a complete teacher evaluation system revision, oversaw all district policy review and revisions, facilitated development of the district Safe School Climate Plan, lead district and school safety planning revision efforts, led Plainville's Hunger Action Team, co-lead the Middle School of Plainville's shift to Standards Based Grading, and more.

LePage also serves on several local and state level committees and organizations including Co-Chair of the Connecticut Association of Public Superintendents Executive Leaders' Roundtable, Plainville Rotary Club, Plainville Coalition for Positive Youth Development, Main Street Community Foundation's Men & Boys' Fund Board of Advisors, CAPSS Technology and Legislative Committees, and several others.

LePage holds a bachelor of science degree and sixth year professional certification in Educational Leadership from Central Connecticut State University, as well as a master of education degree from the University of Hartford, and completed the Executive Leadership Program certification at the University of Connecticut.

"Steve LePage is the absolute right choice for Plainville's next superintendent of schools. I know he will continue to enhance and promote the positive programs that Plainville Community Schools have to offer," said Dr. Brummett.

"I am positively delighted that Mr. LePage will be our next superintendent of Plainville schools. I was on the Board when Steven was hired as the principal of Plainville High School and he did a fantastic job in that position. 

#### **AAA Speaks Out:**

#### Americans Slow to **Adopt Green Vehicles**

AAA's latest survey reveals that despite many Americans having interest in electric vehicles, when asked if most vehicles will be electric by 2029, only 4 in 10 said yes.

AAA believes that similar to other emerging technologies, a lack of knowledge and experience may be contributing to the slow adoption of electric vehicles, despite Americans desire to go green.

"Today, more than 200,000 electric cars can be found on roads across the country as almost every manufacturer sells them," says Amy Parmenter, spokesperson for AAA in Greater Hartford. "But, like other new vehicle technologies, Americans don't have the full story and that could be causing the gap between interest and action."

AAA's annual survey that tracks opinions regarding electric and hybrid vehicles found that while consumer interest remains steady, Americans may not have a solid understanding of electric vehicle performance. For instance, electric vehicles, unlike those running on gas, do better in stop and go traffic because the car can recapture energy to charge the battery when decelerating. However, AAA's survey found that a majority of Americans were unsure of whether electric vehicles have better range when driving at highways speeds or in stop and go traffic. This demonstrates that

many consumers are not sure what to expect from an electric vehicle in two of the most common driving scenarios.

Although most Americans don't believe electric vehicles will be on the road in masses in the next 10 years, AAA did find that 40 million Americans say they would be likely to consider an electric vehicle for their next car purchase, with Millennials leading the pack. Concern for the environment and lower long-term costs remain the leading reasons to go green. Previous objections to buying electric with regards to price and range anxiety continue to ease and have trended downward significantly in just a year's time.

Consumers interested in electric vehicles, but still unsure should research and learn as much as possible about these types of cars. AAA also recommends drivers visit a dealership, test drive an electric vehicle and ask as many questions as possible of the dealer and other electric vehicle owners. It is also important to understand charging options available at home to ensure consumers can take full advantage of electric vehicle technology with the least inconvenience.

Each year AAA (Automobile Club of Southern California Automotive Research Center) produces its Green Car Guide, which rates electric vehicles as well as hybrids and highly fuel efficient cars based on criteria such as ride quality, safety and performance. 

### China, Trade, Tariffs, and President Trump

U.S.-China trade negotiations is a central focus of the Trump Administration's economic and foreign policy. President Trump sees the use of selective tariffs as a tool to be used in order to leverage better trading conditions with China. This use of tariffs follows President Trump's tactical use of tariffs to NAFTA with renegotiate Mexico and Canada and the on-going negotiations with Europe. The threat of tariffs has raised the spectre of the Smoot-Hawley Act which played a role in worsening the effects of the Great Depression. The press coverage of the Trump Administration's trade policy on China has, to a large extent, focused on the immediate economic impact to specific American industries, like agriculture, and the how the Wall Street markets are reacting in the short-term. Fewer media outlets are looking at the long-term problems for the United States' economy with the current economic trading relationship

with China. China provides cheap labor and manufacturing for consumer goods to the West. Go to a Dollar Tree or other dollar store and the shelves are brimming with cheap Chinese goods. While that is good for the consumer and a number of American corporations the current rules regarding trade between the two powers is much more problematic. There are three major components regarding the relationship between China and the United States that is being overlooked by much of the press covering the current trade negotiations. The first is China is not America's trading partner

like a Canada or Britain but America's foremost rival competitor on the global stage, more so than Russia at this point in time and for the foreseeable future. Secondly China has little, to no regard for intellectual property, not copyrights, patents, nor trademarks. Thirdly China has as a policy a requirement for the technology transfers to China by foreign manufacturers operating in China.

It has been noted for years that China does not respect the concept of intellectual property rights. Unlike the United States which has actively promoted intellectual property rights since the founding of the Republic, China does not respect U.S. patents, copyrights, nor trademarks. For decades cheap Chinese knockoffs for American designer brands have flooded the world markets. In 2011 the U.S. International Trade Commission noted that trademark infringement was the number one intellectual property violation China Such violations have not been limited to designer items. China steals American films, music, video games and every type of digital entertainment produced by American firms to be sold in competition with the original American versions. While the United States actively supported China's entry into the World Trade Organization beginning in the 1990's during the Clinton administration and China gained entry to the WTO in 2001, China has yet to make any substantive move to respect intellectual property rights outside of printed books in the last quarter of a century.

While China's lack of respect for intellectual property rights, which is a growing problem for the United States in the digital age, even more problematic with China's requirement to force companies that manufacture or do business in China to agree to technology transfers to China for the privilege of doing that business. For an Apple, Ford, or any business proprietary technology is extremely important to preserving their products' uniqueness, market share, and future viability. For China these transfers speed up the transformation of China into not only a global economic superpower but in many cases are helping China become a dominant military superpower that may well eclipse the United States in the latter half of the 21st Century. The technological leaps China has made in military communications, tracking, missile technologies have come not just through traditional espionage but reverse engineer of American products with dual use technology and technology transfers on products from microchips, cellphones, farm equipment, jetliners, automobiles, satellites and every conceivable product sold to China or manufactured there by American and other Western firms.

The threat of China as the new dominant global power has been discussed by academics but neglected by the mainstream media. D. Cole examined the rise of China's navy in The Great Wall at Sea. Howard W. French has examined China's expansion economically in Africa in China's Second Continent. The Trump Administration is the first American administration that sees China for the economic, political, and military competitor to the United States it is. The administration's use of tariffs to recast the economic playing field, especially with regard to the protection of American intellectual property and technology by forcing the Chinese government to respect copyrights, patents, and trademarks, maybe slightly painful for certain American businesses in the short-term but if successful, is the policy needed in the long-term as the United States moves deeper into the 21st Century.



June is the month of brides. During WWII President Roosevelt completely shut down the borders to immigration. One happy exception was the transportation, at government expense, of brides and children of our servicemen. The War Brides Act of 1945 brought, some 300,000 foreign brides home to America from all over "Operation Diaper Run" the world. in January of 1946 brought the first group of 452 British women and 173 children (and one bridegroom) on the SS Argentina. I recall the romantic arrival of the Queen Mary in New York harbor. 70,000 women and children from Europe, 51747 from the Philipines, 50,000 from Japan were among those welcomed. Those of us who remember them still, applaud their spirit, courage, and contributions to America.

#### **JUNE 6, 1944— D-DAY**

D-DAY: "military lingo for the date of a planned operation or event."

By the spring of 1944 most of continental Europe was under siege by Nazi Germany and they were bombing England. On the morning of June 6, 1944—75 years ago—General Dwight Eisenhower, commander of the Allied forces (U.K., U.S. and Canada) launched the largest air and sea military operation in history, landing on the beaches of Normandy in France. Thus began the series of battles that resulted in the liberation of Europe.



#### From Sarah in Plainville

"Lately I've been having trouble moving like I used to - getting out of bed or the car can be difficult and I get



sore during longer walks. My doctor suggested that I work on my flexibility, but will that really help?"

Flexibility is crucial to mobility, so increasing your flexibility will definitely help you move better and avoid aches and pains! As you age, your muscles deteriorate and stiffen, which limits your range of motion around joints, increasing risk of injury. It doesn't help that people tend to become less active as they get older. Long-term inflexibility can result in permanent muscle damage and poor posture.

A daily regimen of stretches at home can increase your flexibility to help alleviate some of the difficulties you're having and avoid long-term impairment:

1)Treat neck and back stiffness with a Chin Drop – Put the palms of your hands on top of your head and gently drop your chin down to where you feel a stretch in the back of your neck and shoulders, using the natural weight of your arms to softly pull down. Take 5-10 deep breaths and slowly release.

2)Increase mobility and decrease leg soreness with a Forward Fold – Standing straight up and facing forward with your feet side by side, slowly fold your body down towards your feet. Exhale as you bend forward and try to keep your back straight as you bring your fingers towards your toes. Hold

for 2-3 deep breaths and slowly release to standing position.

3)Avoid tightness in your hips with Hip Circles – Standing with your legs hip-width apart, place your hands on your hips and move in slow circles as wide as you can make them without feeling pain. Making sure to keep the rest of your body still, perform 10 circles in each direction.

4)Increase mobility and alleviate pain in your arms and shoulders with Joined Arm Raises – Standing or sitting straight up, interlock your fingers with your palms facing out and push your hands and arms away from your face. Slowly raise your arms upwards and hold for 2-3 deep breaths before gently releasing.

By practicing these exercises daily, or when you're feeling particularly sore and stiff, you can help alleviate pain and tightness while avoiding injuries and permanent damage. Stretching also has a number of other health benefits, including stress release, improved blood flow and increased energy.

Always remember that stretches should feel challenging, but not painful. If you're feeling pain while performing these or other stretches, it means you're pushing too hard. If you continue to feel pain, soreness, limited mobility or other aches in your body, consider scheduling an evaluation for PT. Often times recurring pain and injury points to larger problems. 

## Life With Wanda

This was submitted to me this week "How Plainville Got It's Name" Legend of....
Fucowie Indians Wanda

If you have ever wondered how Plainville got its name this might give you some insight: Well maybe yes, maybe no. This legend was handed down from generation to generation to generation over the years. You may now read what the true story really is, or pretty true, we think, but maybe something was lost in the translation; you know how old people mumble!

Many, many moons ago, with the coming of the white man to the west, a small band of "Plains" Indians were forced east to this very spot, thus the town of "Plain" ville. This small tribe was over powered and were driven

from their teepees by the pale-faces and forced east across the great plains of our country, over mountain ranges, through the deserts, across the mighty Mississippi river, over the mountains of Pennsylvania, on through the swamps of New Jersey, onward, east, forced to find the Hudson River, until their leader, Chief Running Mouth, during the dark of night fell into what is now know as Hamlin Pond. As he dragged himself to the south bank of the pond he shook himself off and shouted, "Ah, where the FUGOWIE??"

At that point Chief Running Mouth along with his wife, Squaw-Forgot-How-To were exhausted, wet and disgusted with their trip and decided to settle on that spot. ## From the Desk of...... Thomas A. Wurz

## **GRADUATION SEASON '19**

It's that time of year again when young adults enjoy the excitement of entering their next stage in life. High School graduation brings a sense of accomplishment, excitement, and optimism for all of the graduates. For most, graduation also presents an opportunity to celebrate with a party. Whenever there is a party, the threat of alcohol being present should always be on the minds of parents. Some parents may try to control the consumption of alcohol by allowing their children to drink under their supervision. However, the dangers associated with underage drinking will persist even when adults are present.

Connecticut criminal law penalizes anyone who sells, ships, delivers, or gives alcoholic liquor to a minor, by any means, with a fine not to exceed \$1,500 or imprisoned not more than 18 months or both. The law specifically outlines parents as a person who may be guilty of this crime. If the minor child were ever to be charged with possessing and consuming the alcohol given to them by their parent(s), then the parents could also be charged with a crime. This law extends to any minor, so if you child's friends consume the alcohol you provided, you expose yourself to criminal charges. The application of the law is probably not that shocking for any parent who may be reading this article. The law may not even be enough to deter some from allowing alcohol at a graduation party. Although, after considering the potential civil liability you expose yourself to you may want to reconsider facilitating any underage drinking.

The potential for anyone to get injured after consuming alcohol is always apparent. When that person is an underage, inexperienced drinker the odds obviously increase exponentially. Therefore, when an adult gives a minor alcohol and that minor injures themselves or others, that adult will be liable for the result. The adult is liable because they set forth the chain of events by supplying the alcohol. Civilly, this opens them up to be sued for the damages they helped create. If the parent or other adult gets a civil judgment ordered against them they may have their wages attached or just about anything they own in order to pay the judgment. Most people would not risk everything they have or may potentially have with someone they trust. So why would anyone risk everything they have to a group of people they may hardly know and have no control over? Regardless of how responsible your children and their friends may be, supplying alcohol to them will always expose you to whatever they do under the influence. Whatever perceived control you may think you have, the reality is that you can never prevent some things. You may end up being liable for something as small as a trip and fall or something as big as a death.

Graduation season is a time for joy and celebration. The last thing anyone wants to think about is an unfortunate incident when they reflect on a graduation. So don't hesitate to tell your kids "No" when it comes to underage drinking. As always, if any of these situations become a reality in your life, consult with a licensed attorney so that you may better understand and protect your rights.



State Representatives William A. Petit Jr. (R-22) co-sponsored a bill that when implemented, would create tougher penalties for those who manufacture, distribute or sell fentanyl, a powerful synthetic opioid.

"Fentanyl is now the leading cause of overdose death in Connecticut and the penalties for its sale and possession should reflect this fact," Rep. Petit said. "It is 50 to 100 times as potent as morphine and far more potent than heroin."

This update to state statutes would remove fentanyl from the synthetic drug category, a drug created using man-made chemicals rather than natural ingredients, and instead place it into the same classification as heroin. Under current Connecticut state law, fentanyl carries a lesser criminal penalty than heroin.

According to the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), fentanyl can be lethal in one millionth of a gram, which is the equivalent to a few granules of table salt. In 2017, more than 670 deaths in Connecticut were reported as a result of fentanyl.

HB-5524 will now awaits action in the Senate.



Not unexpectedly, the film that is the subject of my review has already become not only the most successful films of the year but of all time. Is it also a good film? Here is what I think.

#### **AVENGERS: END GAME**

After the devastating events of Avengers: Infinity War (2018), the universe is in ruins. With the help of remaining allies, the Avengers assemble once more in order to undo Thanos' actions and restore order to the universe.

#### POSSIBLE SPOILERS ALERT!

It is hard to imagine any film that has been more anticipated than this one. After "Infinity War" exceeded all the hopes and dreams of those of us who

have faithfully followed the ten year opus of Marvel's ingenious comic book super heroes' shared universe, we all held our breath and crossed our fingers that Marvel would successfully concoct a culmination worthy of all that lead up to it. Could they successfully bring the many story strings which weaved their way through twenty films together and tie them up in a coherent and crowd pleasing package. "Infinity War" gave us reason to believe this almost impossible to accomplish goal might be realized. "End Game" provides us a resolutely, profound rally cry of "mission accomplished".

My admiration for "Infinity War" was expressed in my review posted here upon its release and the fact that I anointed it my choice for the best film of 2018. I really didn't think Marvel could up its game after that. Yet they did in all the hoped for and in totally unexpected ways. There is emotional depth to rival any film you've ever seen that brought you to tears. It has laugh out loud humor that perfectly counterbalances the dirge of despair that permeates the central core of the story. It brings together pretty much every key player in all the previous films that led up to this finale, some for just a brief moment while others make significant contributions to the story line. It opens with a heart wrenching scene featuring Jeremy Renner's Hawkeye, sorely missing from "Infinity War", having a cookout with his wife and three children. While providing his young daughter with an archery lesson as his wife and two sons prepare the picnic feast, he suddenly finds himself alone, his family all vanished in a swirl of dust. We then find Tony Stark (Robert Downey, Jr.) on a disabled spaceship, deep into the outer regions of the universe with his air supply almost depleted as he records messages to his wife and daughter that he hopes someday they will discover and listen to. The film envelops the audience in a somber tone of dismay, regret and defeat. As he slowly loses his battle to survive, his only companion, Nebula (Karen Gillan), sister of Gamora (Zoe Saldana), keeps watch over him. Just when his life force is about to extinguish, rescue arrives in the form of Captain Marvel (Brie Larson). This sets the stage for the surviving members of The Avengers to regroup and attempt to come up with a solution to reverse the devastation caused by Thanos (James Brolin) using the power of the Infinity Stones.

"End Game" manages to follow through on that feel of astonishment and devastation and profound loss we all felt at the conclusion of "Infinity War" while still injecting some lighthearted moments brought on by the new relationship dynamics of this ad-hoc assembled version of the Avengers. As Downey, Jr. injects world weary pathos in Stark's guilt and remorse over the loss of the young Peter Parker (Tom Holland) whom he had taken under his wing and mentored, we get some sardonic sarcasm from the always abrasively funny raccoon, Rocket (Bradley Cooper). There are some nice light touches provided in the interplay between Larson's Captain Marvel and Downey, Jr.s' Stark as well as Mark Ruffolo's Hulk, Chris Hemsworth's Thor and Don Cheadle's War Machine. There are also some meaningful personal moments between Scarlett Johansson's Black Widow and Chris Evan's Captain America. And for all those who cried foul because "Infinity

War" gave us all Bruce Banner and no Hulk, this film more than makes up for it with super overload of Hulk. The film is filled with well constructed personal moments with these characters we've become so invested in which, in turn, makes the moments of danger, action and uncertainty all the more potent. And those action moments are incredibly impressive and expertly staged. The Russo Brother's once again direct and show off their uncanny ability to cram so much detail into the composition of each shot throughout extended and considerably complex action scenes featuring hundreds of participants without ever losing focus of what they want you to see. It gives these scenes a sense of urgency and importance so that our attention never wavers. The incredible effects are groundbreakingly real and stunningly visualized. It all makes for the swiftest three hours of movie watching I have ever experienced.

I don't know if we will ever have such a monumental moment such as this again even as we proceed into the next phase of the Marvel franchise and into the now changing path of its shared universe. But we had this and this will always be a major milestone in our experience of the great entertainment legacy of cinematic history. I have to mention the fact that this is the first film I have seen in years where key moments were met with unanimous applause by the audience and the appearance of certain characters were greeted with boisterous cheers. I guess that would constitute the perfect rationale for me to refer to it as a 100% qualified crowd pleaser.

## Flag Day Officially Celebrated On June 14th



In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The United States Army also celebrates the U.S. Army Birthdays on this date; Congress adopted "the American continental army" after reaching a consensus position in the Committee of the Whole on June 14, 1775.

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day; in August 1946, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. Flag Day is not an official federal holiday. Title 36 of the United States Code, Subtitle I, Part A, CHAPTER 1, § 110

is the official statute on Flag Day; however, it is at the president's discretion to officially proclaim the observance. On June 14, 1937, Pennsylvania became the first U.S. state to celebrate Flag Day as a state holiday, beginning in the town of Rennerdale. New York Statutes designate the second Sunday in June as Flag Day, a state holiday.

Perhaps the oldest continuing Flag Day parade is in Fairfield, Washington. Beginning in 1909 or 1910, Fairfield has held a parade every year since, with the possible exception of 1918, and celebrated the "Centennial" parade in 2010, along with some other commemorative events. Appleton, Wisconsin, claims to be the oldest National Flag Day parade in the nation, held annually since 1950.

Quincy, Massachusetts, has had an annual Flag Day parade since 1952 and claims it "is the longest-running parade of its kind" in the U.S. The largest Flag Day parade is held annually in Troy, New York, which bases its parade on the Quincy parade and typically draws 50,000 spectators. In addition, the Three Oaks, Michigan, Flag Day Parade is held annually on the weekend of Flag Day and is a three-day event and they claim to have the largest flag day parade in the nation as well as the oldest in Washington, D.C.
