

#### Robert E. Lee, Town Manager's Report to Town Council September 17th Town Council Meeting

#### Wheeler Elementary School Project Update

- A Project Kick-off Meeting with all of the contractors was held last Wednesday. The Project Manager reviewed all aspects of the renovations emphasizing the need for safety while school is in session. All workers will be required to have background checks before being allowed onsite. These background checks will be reviewed by the Plainville Police Department.
- O&G has submitted their "Guaranteed Maximum Price Amendment" to their contract. This document takes into account the contractors that submitted the lowest qualified bids, Inspection and Construction Services, Bonds & Insurance and Contingencies. The total guaranteed proposal cost is \$18,565,019.
- The project is being done in phases and the substantial completion date is February, 2020.
- There is an item under New Business regarding the Guaranteed Maximum Price Amendment with O&G.

### **High School Parking Lot Project Update**

 The Plainville High School site improvement project is substantially complete. A punch list of the outstanding remaining items has been compiled by the Construction Manager. The punch list items are expected to be completed in the near future.

#### WPC Phosphorus Upgrade Project Update

The project is beginning to ramp up. Some contaminated soils were found on-site during the excavation for the new building to house the dewatering equipment. It is being tested to determine what cost, if any, will be required in order to dispose of the material.

#### **Sludge Transportation**

- The treatment plant produces approximately 200 loads of sludge per year. This sludge is transported to the Mattabassett Treatment Plant in Cromwell where it is incinerated.
- The Town recently received two quotes for transportation of the sludge. The low quote was submitted by H.I. Stone & Sons for a cost of \$172.50 per load. The current price being charged by J&M is \$175.00 per load.
- The quote was for a three-year time period. H.I. Stone proposed an increase in the second year to \$176.80 (2.5%) and to \$181.00 in

- the third year (2.4%) H.I. Stone has worked for the WPC Facility in the past and they have done a good job.
- Town staff is recommending that the Town Council award a threeyear contract to transport sludge to H.I. Stone & Sons. There is an item under New Business regarding this recommendation.

#### **Bond Sale**

- On September 5th the Town received six bids to purchase \$10M in General Obligation Bonds for Plainville. The bond sale included \$4.9 for Roads, \$3M for schools and \$2.1M for fire trucks. The low bid was submitted by Morgan Stanley with a total interest cost of 3.099867% and included a premium of \$99,840.
  - Before the bid, Town staff and the financial advisor had a conference call with Standard & Poor to determine the Town's S&P affirmed credit rating. Plainville's credit rating of AA+ with a stable outlook. This is one notch below a Triple A rating. By assigning this rating S&P noted the following factors: A strong economy, adequate management, strong budgetary performance, very strong budgetary flexibility, very strong liquidity, very strong debt and contingent liability position and a strong institutional framework score. The S&P analysis has been posted on the Town's website.
- Plainville's financial advisor updated the Town's Debt Analysis using the Morgan Stanley low bid. For FY19, the debt service line item will be approximately \$562K below the \$4.4M cap established by the Town Council. A portion of these savings will be used in FY20 when the \$4.4 cap will be exceeded by \$324K.
- All future years will be under the cap. The updated plan anticipates that the Town will bond another \$8M in September 2020.

#### Robertson Airport – On-Call Consultant and Interstate Aviation Lease

• Last Spring the Aviation Commission issued a Request for Proposals for On-Call Consulting Services. Six proposals were received and four were interviewed by the Commission. They conducted a second round of interviews with two finalists and, in late August, voted unanimously to recommend that AECOM of Rocky Hill be engaged to provide

- consulting services for Robertson Airport. Most of their services would be reimbursed by state and federal grants as part of the airport improvement projects.
- The Aviation Commission was also informed that Interstate Aviation is selling their business to New England Aviation LLC. New England Aviation is owned by Nick Scata and Zivorad Tomic. Mr. Scata is a local businessman who operates two companies in Plainville and is also an instructor and pilot at Robertson Airport.
- New England Aviation attended two recent Aviation Commission meetings. As part of the purchase, they have requested that the current lease be amended to allow for a lower lease payment for the next two years to give them the opportunity to grow the business. The proposed lease payment would still exceed the budgeted yearly expenditures during the remaining two years of the lease.
- After considerable discussion among the Aviation Commission members, the Town Attorney and the Town Manager, the Commission voted to accept the New England Aviation proposal and recommend it to the Town Council.
- There is an item under New Business regarding the recommendation of the Aviation Commission to accept amending the Robertson Airport Lease as proposed by New England Aviation.

#### Tax Fixing Agreement – Tech 2, LLC

- On May 18, 2017 the Economic Development Agency made a recommendation that the Town offer a tax abatement to TEC 2, LLC (Metro Realty) for certain real property improvements at 29 Northwest Drive.
- On June 19, 2017 the Town Council ratified the EDA's recommendation for a tax abatement and a Memorandum of Understanding which outlined the terms of the abatement was finalized. The improvements have been completed per the MOU and a Certificate of Occupancy has been issued.
- The next step in the process is to execute a Tax Assessment Fixing Agreement. The TFA has been reviewed and approved by the Town Attorney.
- The new building totals 33,600 square feet and includes an office and distribution center at

- 29 Northwest Drive. The tax abatement is for five years. The first year would provide a 50% tax abatement for the improvements. This abatement would be reduced by 10% per year for the remaining four years.
- There is an item under New Business regarding the proposed Tax Assessment Fixing Agreement with Tech 2, LLC for 29 Northwest Drive.

#### **Rabbit Ears and TV Dinners**

As I sat and watched my 42 inch tv last night, an advertisement for a packaged dinner for 1 person came across the screen.

This brought me back to a day when my family had one of the first television sets that was ever made. When we turned it on, lines scrolled up and down the screen and it looked as if someone had sprinkled salt and pepper across the screen. The furniture that held the TV was 5 times larger that the screen itself. We only really received 2 good channels, channel 3 and 4. To get channel 8 and 30 required technical skills of the family. We would proceed to the kitchen for aluminum foil, adjust a moveable antenna called rabbit ears on top of the TV and then wrap the aluminum foil around the tips of the rabbit ears. Depending on the reception coming through, we would walk around the room pointing the rabbit ears toward windows to see if we could produce a better picture. When we found the right spot, the person holding the rabbit ears had to stand still until we could find something to place these rabbit ears on so we wouldn't loose reception. The TV screen was 8 inches wide, and the whole neighborhood of children who did not have a TV yet would gather around it.

Shortly after the TV came TV dinners. The aluminum plate that the meal came in was bigger than the screen on the television. The meal came with potato, meat, vegetable and dessert. This was the beginning of families not eating at the dining room table anymore. I compare the size of those TV dinners to frozen dinners today and the ones today are only about 5 inches long and are on paper plates not aluminum. Boy, have times changed.

I tend to leave my television on all night sometimes. But I remember that "back in the day", around 11 p.m., a huge symbol would come across the screen and then the American flag would appear as the Star Spangled Banner music played. That meant, that there would be no more shows shown for the evening. It was like "Big Brother" saying GO TO BED!

We have come so far. The TV screens are bigger than the dinners and we use aluminum foil to wrap food instead of rabbit ears.





### Jobs, Taxes and the Governor's Race

The first debate between the candidates for Connecticut's next governor heavily focused on taxes and Connecticut's less than robust economy. Republican Bob Stefanowski proposes gradually eliminating the state income tax and reducing other taxes while Democrat Ned Lamont has proposed and supported the raising of a variety of taxes, including supporting the addition of tolls to Connecticut's highways. Stefanowski argues the reduction in taxes is needed to give the Connecticut economy a boost and can be done by eliminating waste and restructuring public employee contracts regarding pensions while Lamont argues the state needs more revenues to fix itself, its infrastructure and that will spur the economy. The question of which vision for Connecticut is the more likely to prove successful may be found in Connecticut's immediate past.

Governor Malloy and the Democrat-led State Legislature have imposed the two largest tax increases in Connecticut history during Governor Malloy's two terms as Governor. During that time Connecticut has hemorrhaged companies and people as they have fled the state. According to the United Van Lines survey of people moving the number one reason individuals have left Connecticut over the last year is employment and the majority of those leaving earn \$150,000 or more. As The Atlantic noted Connecticut has had one of the slowest job growths in the nation over the last two decades. People are leaving, skilled workers, high earners, wealthy retirees are all leaving. Young people are looking elsewhere for their future rather than staying in Connecticut.

Companies are fleeing as well. GE closed up its Fairfield home office last year and sold off their facility in Plainville to ABB. Alexion Pharmaceuticals has followed GE up to Boston. Edible Arrangements is moving its home office from Wallingford to Atlanta, Georgia where the corporate tax rate is much lower. A myriad of other companies and small businesses

have fled Connecticut's high taxes and uncertain financial situation. From these examples it would seem obvious that higher taxes will not stimulate job growth.

But can the State of Connecticut function without the high taxes it has imposed. Can the government provide the services it needs to without the tax increases Ned Lamont proposes? Stefanowski argues yes. If we look at just a few examples of spending by Governor Malloy's administration we may see which candidate makes more sense. For example did the State need to spend \$9.1 million on improvements to Silver Sands State Park that neither the residents of Milford nor their representatives requested, wanted, nor needed? Did the State need to spend thousands of dollars on new benches for an area of the Quinnipiac River State Park that constantly floods and is used almost exclusively by motorists stretching their legs at the North Haven rest stop along Route 15? Did the State need to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars to build a monument in New Britain to a National Guard Unit that was based in Puerto Rico and never was in Connecticut? While none of the above examples are "waste" in the sense of "waste and fraud" to many people, it can be argued all are luxury spending that is not needed and diverts resources from truly necessities. This is akin to building a gazebo in the backyard when you really need to fix your roof.

From the examples above it seems obvious that the State of Connecticut can trim its spending. The out-flow of people and companies Connecticut is experiencing is related to excessive taxation. The solution seems self-evident, cutting unnecessary spending and cutting taxes is a far better recipe to improve Connecticut's economy than raising more taxes combined with the irresponsible spending. The latter did not work for Governor Malloy why should anyone expect the same to work for Ned Lamont.

to conservation in all five Plainville schools. Thanks to the daily efforts of each and every employee and student to conserve wherever possible each day, our utilities cost savings has been remarkable. We are able to reinvest the funds that we are not using on utilities, back into students, teaching and learning," explained Director of Community Relations, Lynn Davis.

The district energy program is also positively impacting the local and global environments. Since inception of the program, the district has reduced electric consumption by 8,260,103 kWh and natural gas consumption by 389,886 CCF. This cumulative greenhouse gas reduction is equivalent to 4,175 metric tons of CO2 and equates to 870 passenger cars not driven for one year, or 107,062 tree seedlings grown for 10 years.



impact of unfunded mandates to towns and Boards of Education. The commission meets monthly at the Legislative Office Building in



independence is a win-win for older drivers, their families and everyone with whom they share the road".

AAA recommends that families start talking about driving with older adults before there are "red flags" like crashes, scrapes on the car, new medical diagnoses or worsening health conditions. When talking to an older driver, families should:

Start early and talk often: Be positive, be supportive and focus on ways to help keep them safe when behind the wheel, including other forms of transportation available to older drivers.

Avoid generalizations: Do not jump to conclusions about an older driver's skills or abilities.

Speak one-on-one: Keep the discussion between you and the older driver. Inviting the whole family to the conversation can create feelings of alienation or anger.

Focus on the facts: Stick to information you know, like a medical condition or medication regimen that might make driving unsafe. Do not accuse an older driver of being unsafe or assume that driving should be stopped altogether.

Plan Together: Allow the older driver to play an active role in developing the plan for their driving retirement.

Past research from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found that older adults who have stopped driving are almost two times more likely to suffer from depression and nearly five times as likely to enter a long-term care facility as those who remain behind the wheel. 

### **Kindness Lessons** from a Puppy!

My dog Cooper loves to fetch. His enthusiasm goes up by a factor of at least 20 when the ball is thrown into the lake. He flies into the water, makes a beeline to the ball, snaps it up in his mouth and proudly brings it back to shore where he shakes while everyone standing by runs for cover. Then he barks to signal he is ready to start the process all over again. Countless videos have recorded his super swimming skills. If he was in charge, this would continue all day.

Most of the time, he has exclusive rights to a spot on the lake and the ball. On occasion, another dog will wander over and join in the game. There has never really been an issue with who gets the ball. Cooper is happy to swim out and back even if the other dog gets there first. For example, Cooper was with two of his doggie friends when a large stick was thrown in. Cooper and his two pals managed to all arrive at the same time and then swam side by side to shore with each one hanging on to a piece of that stick. It was truly adorable.

However, this summer, the table was turned. And it's not what you might think. We had company and Cinder, a beautiful well-trained Lab, 3 years younger than Cooper came over to join in the fun.

Very soon it became apparent that Cinder was much faster than Cooper and always got to the ball first. At first, I noticed that Cinder was giving Cooper a head start. But once in the water, the lab's competitive instincts took over and she outpaced Cooper every time.

All of a sudden, Cinder disappears and comes back with another ball hidden somewhere in the yard. She looked at me and those eyes told me it was time to let Cooper win. So, I threw one of the balls to Cooper and Cinder sat there with the other ball in front of her facing 90 degrees away from where Cooper was swimming. I got this message and threw the second ball away from Cooper's line of sight while Cinder jumped to retrieve her ball. Meanwhile, Cooper was beaming as he dog-paddled back to the dock with his prize.

This didn't just happen once, but for the rest of the time we played, I would throw Cooper the ball and Cinder would wait poised with her body position telling me where to send her ball.





## THE IMPORTANCE OF BENEFICIARY DESIGNATION

When opening an IRA account or Life Insurance policy it is easy to glance over the fine print on the beneficiary page. Usually, we are just concerned with who will get the money and where do I sign. However, you need to be aware of where your money will go if something happens to your beneficiaries. The fine print is where these details are spelled out.

Typically, when opening a financial account or a life insurance policy you will be required to name a beneficiary and a contingent beneficiary. This is not always the case though. Sometimes you may just be asked to name multiple primary beneficiaries allocating a percentage to each. So what happens if a primary beneficiary dies? Upon such an event, it is incumbent upon the account holder to change the beneficiary to an entity that may receive the funds. This could be a person, a trust, or some other legally enforceable entity.

What happens when a primary beneficiary dies and the account holder fails to change the beneficiary before they die? Then, we go to the fine print! There will be some indication as to how the conveyance was made. The standard language is either "per capita" or "per stirpes". This is where it is importance for an account holder to know what they are conveying. If they want to give their beneficiary a sole interest so that the money only goes to them if they are alive then they should indicate that it is a per capita transfer. If the account holder wants to convey all rights and responsibilities so that the beneficiary's heirs can make a claim for the money then they should indicate that it is a per stirpes transfer.

If the account holder fails to spell out exactly the interest they are transferring, than their heirs may find themselves in a dispute down the line. Also, many people place too much faith in their financial institution to have all their ducks in a row. Simply put... don't think that the finance guys can properly advise you about your legal rights and obligations. More often than not, they don't know because they didn't draft up the paperwork. Proper estate planning requires the eye of a trained legal professional.

Most of us hope that none of these issues will ever come to a head and end up in court. Yet, when there is money on the table and competing interests, nothing should be left to chance. Spending some time properly planning your estate and reviewing financial documents will help keep the peace after you have passed. Something we all should strive for in these crazy times.

This month's review is of one of this summer's biggest blockbusters which is now out on Blu-Ray disc.

## JURASSIC WORLD FALLEN KINGDOM

2018 Rated "PG-13"
Starring:
Chris Pratt, Bryce Dallas Howard

directed by J.A. Bayona

When the dormant volcano on the island that housed the now defunct Jurassic World Amusement Park suddenly awakens with catastrophic eruptions, former park manager Claire Dearing and dinosaur whisperer Owen Grady team up again to mount a daring rescue of the remaining dinosaurs and transport them to a safe sanctuary.

I begin my review with a consumer protection warning. If you are looking for a totally objective, unbiased, balanced critical review of "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom" you've come to the wrong place. In this particular circumstance, this specific movie reviewer does not have the capability to render such a product. For as long as my memory will allow me to recall, I have been absolutely looney tunes about films pitting man against the mighty dinosaurs. I championed Ray Harryhausen films for their realistic depictions of these majestic beasts and I cursed out Hollywood for such otherwise decent films like "Journey To The Center of the Earth" or "The Lost World" being defiled by using

lizards with prosthetic fins attached to their backs as prehistoric creatures. How dumb do they think we are? I rejected the man in the dinosaur suit phoniness of the Toho films including "Godzilla" in favor of stop motion menaces in films like "Valley of the Gwangi". The "Jurassic Park" trilogy brought a whole new form of realism to the genre with its animatronics and cgi effects. Even the lesser entry #3 still was a thrilling watch for me. So, it is no surprise that the resurrection of the Jurassic franchise with "Jurassic World" was quite a thrill for me. The unexpectedly phenomenal success of "Jurassic World" proved that I am not alone in my enthusiasm for the rampaging dinosaur genre. A box office hit was certainly expected. But a blockbuster two billion dollar topper

was far more than anticipated.

Which brings us to the latest entry in the franchise, "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom". Now I'm not going to use my platform to convince you this is a great film. I'm not so blinded by my personal affection for such films that I am unaware that this is far from a great film. But no one will ever convince me that it isn't grand entertainment on a super sized level! There is enough dinosaur action to please the the hard headed cynic and the dinosaurs themselves are magnificently rendered. It appears to me that the filmmakers went back to some natural effects to blend in with the cgi and it gives the film an overall more authentic look and feel. The script by Derek Connolly and the first film's director, Colin Trevorrow, while not a Pulitzer Prize winner, is far more detailed and complex than its predecessor. It even has an intriguing twist toward the film's climax that raises one's curiosity as to where they are going to go with it in the third installment. J.A. Boyona takes the director's chair and he is a far more interesting director than Trevorrow. His "The Orphanage" and "The Impossible" demonstrated his skill and creativity beyond a shadow of a doubt and made him an exciting choice for this endeavor. While it isn't quite up to his previous work, his direction is still more stylish and original than we've seen previously. There are certain restrictions that constrain a director when doing a franchise film and Boyona had to work with them. He did and he has provided us with a substantially more riveting film, a film more closely reminiscent of the original "Jurassic Park" and because of that, a more totally satisfying experience

The chemistry between Chris Pratt's Owen and Bryce Dallas Howard's Claire is more defined and natural this time around due to a far better delineation of Howard's character. Less shrill and more amenable (and without high heels), Howard gives us a reason to embrace Claire and enjoy the interplay between her and Pratt's Owen. Pratt also feels more comfortable with Owen and has mastered the quick quip and irrassible personality of this well meaning pioneer in the art of dinosaur Pratt and Howard play bonding. well off one another and make for a charismatic twosome.

The cast is filled with dependable performers who all add definable personalities to their rolls. Rafe Spall, Ted Levine, James Cromwell,



Geraldine Chaplin and Toby Jones all apply their talents to the roles they are entrusted with while newcomers Justice Smith and Daniella Pineda are pleasant additions to the "rescue the dinosaurs" crew. Young newcomer Isabela Sermon makes a positive first impression as Maisie Lockwood who figures prominently in the film's unexpected reveal, setting up many questions as to what is to come. Familiar faces from the original "Jurassic Park" also turn up to contribute in the appearances of Jeff Goldblum and B.D. Wong.

But this is the dinosaurs' show and what a show they put on. With mind boggling effects and a nonstop pace of well staged action all set to an invigorating score, there is no time to be burdened by potential plot holes or inexplicable character behavior. It's there, of course, but it doesn't jeopardize the exhilarating pace nor the guilty pleasure of getting a whole heap of Jurassic jollies watching two hours plus of pure unadulterated prehistoric plentifullness. Some people think too much. I don't watch films like "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom" to overthink it. I watch to simply enjoy them.







#### **How to Handle Low Blood Sugar**

#### What is low blood sugar?

Low blood sugar (also called hypoglycemia) is when your blood sugar is 70 mg/dL or lower (or the number your health care provider tells you). If your blood sugar is too low and you do not eat something right away you could fall, pass out, have a seizure, or go into a coma. Hypoglycemia is a common, muchfeared adverse effect experienced by many patients with type 2 diabetes mellitus. Hypoglycemia can range from mild to severe and can lead to injury and death.

#### What causes low blood sugar?

Low blood sugar happens when: You don't eat enough food, you don't

You are taking too much of your diabetes medicine

You are more active than usual

eat on time, or you skip a meal

You drink alcohol without eating any

There are a number of factors which increase the risk of hypoglycemia in patients with type 2 diabetes. All of these are related to a relative or absolute excess of insulin. Some hypoglycemia factors include excessive, risk incorrect, or poorly timed doses of insulin or an insulin secretagogue such as a sulfonylurea; missed, delayed, or insufficient food intake; excessive glucose utilization as can occur during exercise; a reduction in endogenous glucose production as occurs after alcohol ingestion; or a reduced clearance of insulin or sulfonylureas as occurs with renal failure. Fasting can also cause hypoglycemia.

#### How do I know if my blood sugar is too low?

You may feel different when you have low blood sugar. You may feel shaky, dizzy, sweaty, or anxious. You may get confused.But some people do not know when their blood sugar gets too low until it is dangerously low. This can happen if you have had a lot of low blood sugars in the past.

If you have had low blood sugars, you should wear a medical alert bracelet that says you have diabetes. This is so people will know how to help you if you pass out.

What should I do if my blood sugar is

Advise following the mantra, "test, treat, test, eat."

Advise TESTing blood glucose when patients have symptoms of hypoglycemia...shaking, sweating, palpitations, dizziness, etc.

If you feel like your blood sugar is

low, check your blood sugar with your blood glucose meter. If it is low, eat carbohydrates right away. You should always carry a fast-acting carbohydrate snack with you. A rule to follow is to eat 15 grams of carbohydrates, wait 15 minutes, and then check your blood sugar again. If it is still low, eat another 15 grams of carbohydrates and check your blood sugar again in 15 minutes.

After your blood sugar gets better, you should eat a snack or meal at your usual mealtime. But if your mealtime will not be for an hour or more, you should be sure to eat a snack.

#### How do I know the right amount of carbohydrates to eat?

If your sugar is low, you need to eat about 15 grams of carbohydrates. But carbohydrates with a lot of fat in them will not work as quickly. Some good choices that contain about 15 grams of carbohydrates include:

Glucose tablets (3-4 tablets)

Glucose gel (one small tube)

Sugar (1 tablespoon or 5 sugar cubes) Corn syrup, honey, or syrup (1 tablespoon)

Crackers (4-5 saltine crackers)

Hard candy (5-6 pieces)

Non-fat milk (8 ounces)

Orange juice (4 ounces)

Raisins (2 tablespoons) Soda (not diet) (4 ounces)

If you take Precose (acarbose) or Glyset (miglitol) for your diabetes, you must use glucose gel or tablets, non-fat milk, or honey. Other kinds of carbohydrates will not work quickly enough if you take these medicines.

What if someone passes out because of low blood sugar?

People who pass out or can't swallow should not be given anything to eat or drink. Instead, they need a shot of glucagon. If you are at risk of very low blood sugar, your health care provider will give you a prescription for glucagon. It is important to always carry your glucagon with you. You should also teach friends and family how to give you glucagon. If you pass out, someone should also call 911 right

Glucagon is available as a kit containing a powder for reconstitution and diluent. Because the kits are meant to be used in an emergency situation, patients who experience severe hypoglycemia should have glucagon readily available. Family members, caregivers, and close friends should be trained ahead of time to give glucagon and should be told that glucagon can be given just like a dose of insulin is administered. Glucagon is only given to an unconscious, unresponsive, or confused patient who cannot consume oral carbohydrates.

Glucagon 1 mg (1 mL) can be given subcutaneously or intramuscularly, usually in the buttock, thigh, or arm. If the patient does not respond within 15 minutes, another dose should be given. If glucagon is given, the caregivers should turn the patient on their side to prevent choking (since they may vomit). As soon as the patient is awake and able to swallow, the patient should be given a source of short-acting carbohydrate (e.g., sugar, glucose) and a longeracting carbohydrate (e.g., crackers, sandwich). Any unused reconstituted glucagon solution should be discarded. Hypoglycemia is a common, potentially severe complication encountered in all patients with diabetes. Prevention of hypoglycemia is vital. However, in patients who develop hypoglycemia, early recognition and appropriate treatment should be stressed. Patients and their caregivers should understand the risk factors and treatment of hypoglycemia. Patients at high risk for hypoglycemia or those who experience episodes of severe hypoglycemia should carry glucagon and be familiar

with its use. When you have diabetes it is important to check your blood sugar to make sure it is at a healthy level. If you can keep your blood sugar from getting too low or too high, you can lower the chance of having problems due to diabetes, and you will feel better too. If your blood sugar is too low, you may feel tired and sick. If your blood sugar is too high, you may damage your nerves, eyes, kidneys, and blood vessels.

By keeping your blood sugar at the right level, you will be healthier, and feel better too. Be sure to ask your healthcare provider if you have any questions.

#### **How Do We Know The Bible Is True?**

1) The Bible claims to be the inspired word of God. in 2 Timothy 3:16, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God." This means that all of the Bible (39 Old Testament books and 27 NewTestament books) are God breathed and God is a God that cannot lie (Titus 1:2). If the Bible is indeed inspired, then there should be evidence for it being true right? This brings me to the second evidence.

2) Fulfilled prophecies

Now I could give you hundreds of prophecies in the Bible that have already been fulfilled to the letter. But allow me to just mention three. In Isaiah 7:14 Isaiah prophesied that the Messiah would be born through a virgin. This prophecy was given 700 years before Jesus was born through the virgin Mary. In Micah 5:2 Micah the prophet predicted that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem of Judea. This prophecy was too given 700 years before Jesus Christ came on the scene. In Daniel 9:24-27 Daniel is given a prophecy concerning when the Messiah would come. He would come 483 years after the commandment was given to Nehemiah to go to Israel and rebuild Jerusalem (Nehemiah 2:1-8) which was around 444 B.C. 483 years later would be around 33 A.D. the time when Jesus entered into Jerusalem in His triumphal entry and 5 days later was crucified. The Bible is true and Jesus is the only way to heaven (John 14:6). He died on the cross for your sins, was buried and rose again the third day. Have your trusted Him as your personal Savior?






## Life With Wanda

#### **PASTRY CREAM**

2 cups milk

4 egg yolks

½ cup sugar

½ cup flour

1 teaspoon peppermint extract

Scald the milk. Beat egg yolks and sugar together with a wire whisk. Add flour. Slowly pour on the hot milk stirring constantly. Stir over a slow fire until the mixture thickens. Remove and pour into a cold mixing bowl. When cool, add the peppermint extract.

#### **HAZELNUT &** ASPARAGUS SOUP

1/2 cup hazelnuts

1 tablespoon butter

1 Onion, finely chopped

2 ounces boiled ham

5 cups chicken stock

1/2 cup heavy cream

10 ounce-can asparagus tips in 1" pieces

Soak nuts briefly in hot water and remove skins. Dry, saute until golden in butter, drain and reserve. Saute' onion in the same butter, but do not brown. Put nuts, onion and ham into blender with a little of the stock and blend to a smooth paste. Heat remaining stock and nut mixture, stirring to blend well. Simmer for 10-15 minutes. Remove frm heat and beat in the cream. Add the asparagus tips. Reheat soup without allowing it boil. Serves 6.

### FOR GOODNESS SAKE ANNOUNCES MOVE TO PLAINVILLE

Doubling the number of clients and donors from 2017-2018 creates need for larger space Bristol, CT, August 23, 2018– For Goodness Sake, a local 501c3 nonprofitthat provides donated furniture and household goods to individuals and families transitioning to independent living, has announced that it will be moving in September from its Bristol location to a larger warehouse space at 123 Whiting Street, Unit A, in Plainville. The primary reason for the move is to gain additional space. For Goodness Sake has grown rapidly, and more warehouse space is critical for the organization to be able to effectivelyserve its clients. In the last year, For Goodness Sake has doubled the number of clients it serves and is currently providing furniture and household goods to 32+families and individuals every month. Many clients are coming from shelters and have no furniture—they need beds for themselves and their children, dressers, living room and kitchen furniture, and basic

household goods. Because of limited space in the current warehouse, For Goodness Sake has been forced to turn away furniture donations because there is no room to keep it. The new warehouse in Plainville will allow the organization to fillthe needs of clients today and, after the move, For Goodness Sake expects to be able to serve even more people. In addition to being larger, the new warehouse space will be more comfortable for both clients and volunteers. It will have A/C in the summer, heat in the winter, and a

convenient bathroom. There will be room to walk around easily and maneuver the furniture safely. The new location is close to the bus line, has quick access to I-84, and has plenty of parking. The more central location will make it easier for clients to get to the warehouse to pick out furniture, and For Goodness Sake will be able to make more deliveries in a shorter amount of time. The new location will also be handicap accessible so disabled and elderly clients will be able to shop more easily. Kendra Morales, founder and president of For Goodness Sake, explains why the organization is moving from Bristol to Plainville: "Bristol has been our home from the beginning and has been very good to us. We considered several locations in Bristol, but none of them met our needs. Although we started in Bristol, For Goodness Sake serves 10 towns in central Connecticut, and we are planning on expanding our





service area. The Plainville location fillsall our requirements, including a larger space, a good layout, reasonable rent, and convenient access to I-84. I want to reassure our Bristol supporters that For Goodness Sake will continue to serve Bristol the same as it always has. Actually, we will be serving Bristol even better thanks to the additional space that we will

have." The new space means an increase in rent for the organization, so For Goodness Sake, which is run entirely by volunteers and depends on support from the community, will need additional financial support and volunteers to continue to grow. Visit their website at www. forgoodnessake.org to findout how to donate or volunteer. For Goodness Sake provides direct aid, such as furniture and household goods, making an empty space into a home. The organization accepts gently used furniture and household goods from the community and distributes them to people in need, serving families and individuals

in Bristol, Burlington, Farmington, Harwinton, New Britain, Plainville, Plantsville, Plymouth, Southington, West Hartford, and Wolcott. Clients must be referred from a partner agency.







#### **History of All Saints' Day**



All Saints' Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, Hallowmas,[3][4] Feast of All Saints,[5] [6] or Solemnity of All Saints,[7] is a Christian festival celebrated in honour of all the saints, known and unknown. In Western Christianity, it is

celebrated on 1 November by the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion, the Methodist Church, the Lutheran Church, and other Protestant churches. The Eastern Orthodox Church and associated Eastern Catholic churches celebrate it on the first Sunday after Pentecost.[8] Oriental Orthodox churches of Chaldea and associated Eastern Catholic churches celebrate All Saints' Day on the first Friday after Easter [9]

Christian celebration of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven (the "Church triumphant"), and the living (the "Church militant"). In Catholic theology, the day commemorates all those who have attained the beatific vision in Heaven. It is a national holiday in many historically Catholic countries. In Methodist theology, All Saints Day revolves around "giving God solemn thanks for the lives and deaths of his saints", including those who are "famous or obscure".[10] As such, individuals throughout the Church Universal are honoured, such as Paul the Apostle, Augustine of Hippo and John Wesley, in addition to individuals who have personally led one to faith in Jesus, such as one's grandmother or friend.[10]

In the Western Christian practice, the liturgical celebration begins at Vespers on the evening of 31 October, All Hallows' Eve (All Saints' Eve), and ends at the close of 1 November. It is thus the day before All Souls' Day, which commemorates the faithful departed. In many traditions, All Saints' Day is part of the triduum of Allhallowtide, which lasts three days from 31 October to 2 November inclusive.[11]

In the British Isles, it is known that churches were already celebrating All Saints on 1 November at the beginning of the 8th century to coincide with or replace the Celtic festival of Samhain.[12][13][14] [15] James Frazer suggests that 1 November was chosen because it was the date of the Celtic festival of the dead (Samhain). However, Ronald Hutton points out that, according to Óengus of Tallaght (d. ca. 824), the 7th/8th century church in Ireland celebrated All Saints on 20 April. He suggests that 1 November date was a Germanic rather than a Celtic idea.[12]
